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Literacy **Committee Update**

On November 20th, our entire staff participated in an all virtual learning staff development day that was designed by our Trumbull County ESC to begin the implementation of our literacy initiative that addresses a redesign of our literacy instruction to follow "The Science of Reading".

While it may seem complicated, what it means for our staff and students moving forward is that we have an evidence-based approach that has been supported by years of brain research. This research supports a systematic approach to the teaching of reading that follows a particular sequential pattern that begins with a focus on sound and not sight.

Teachers spent the day with some very heavy topics in understanding how the parts of the brain process and develop the ability to read.

What does that mean for you as parents? This is a dramatic shift in the way that we teach reading. If a students struggles or has gaps in the development process, those pieces have to be filled in for the student to become a proficient reader.

It will take years for us to see and celebrate the positive impact this will have for our students here at LaBrae.

Interims for Second Quarter

Progress Reports will be sent home with students on Wednesday, December 2nd for the Scarlet Cohort & Grade 3, and Thursday, December 3rd for the Gray Cohort.

Please sign and return the interim so we know you received the progress report.

Included with the progress report, there may also be a an advanced notification of the possibility that your child may be not meeting grade level expectations in preparation for advancement to the next grade level.

We begin analysis of retention considerations beginning in January. If your child is significantly behind and not completing the required work in school or remotely, we are giving you advance notification of this very real possibility.

While we recognize that there have been some obstacles in setting up our remote learning platforms, all students have had proper training, adequate equipment and should be able quite capable of meeting the minimum requirements we have established for the remote days.







Dress Code

Reminders

Just a reminder that shorts are no longer permitted as of October, 31st. Even if the weather turns warmer, please follow the calendar guidelines from the LIS handbook.

Please make sure that your children are adequately dressed for the cold weather. For this season, a hoodie or sweatshirt is not warm enough. We do have extra coats, hats, gloves and scarves available for students if there is a need. You simply just need to let us know.

Students will still be going out for recess unless the temperature or wind chill is well below freezing. If classes are going outside for recess and students are not appropriately dressed-they will not be permitted to go outdoors.

Masks should be laundered frequently. We remind students often that their masks need to be taken home and washed. There are some LaBrae

masks still available if you could like to purchase an extra one.

Coats should not be worn during the school day inside. It may be a good idea for students to keep an extra zipper hoodie or sweater here at school to put on or take off as needed.



1, 000,000 solved facts


23,000 New Fluent Facts
