
PERMANENT PICK UP

Permanent Pick Up is going really well. We are loading and unloading students at LIS both at the beginning and end of the day in front of the LIS office.

Parents can fill out the Google form that was sent out in a group email or stop in

the office and fill out a paper form. You will be given a rear view mirror card (2) to display on your mirror or hold up at the end of the day. It has the names of your children on the bottom.

We will be checking your ID if you are new to our district or if someone new is picking up students. You do not need to come in and sign out your students, we will be walking them out through the high school office and down the sidewalk, where they should enter



If you among the first to arrive for permanent pick up, you should pull forward to the high school office entrance. Please make sure that you close the gaps in the parking line so that we have cars close together to make our loading go very quickly and efficiently. Thank you for adjusting to this new routine.

CHROMEBOOKS

We have had some call from families for Chromebooks. Arrangements have to be made through the Board Office.



MASKS:

Students were all given a LaBrae School Mask. They also have a lanyard to attach the mask.

Please make sure that you are washing those masks frequently.

Students probably need to have several masks so they can trade them off an have a clean mask to wear.

While gators are permitted by the health department, it should be noted that they are the least effective type of masking.

Remember they cannot come into the building or get on the bus without a mask.



GOOGLE CLASSROOM

& REMOTE DAYS!

The best way to get assistance for Google Classroom on your child's remote days is to contact the teacher.

I will send out an attachment accompanying this newsletter that is a Student Cheat Sheet for Google Classroom. This may help answer some questions you have about how to maneuver through Google Classroom.

If you do contact the teacher either through Remind or email, please be patient as teacher's are teaching the other half of the students.

They will get back to you in a timely manner.



RECESS

We have scheduled recess for our students at LIS. The students are partnered with another class so that two classes at a time are on the playground with two staff persons. Because of the social distancing, students will may not be scheduled everyday but will have a recess break in their classrooms. We are very conscious of the needs that students have to physically move and have a time outside, so we are making every effort to include that time in our school day, while also be very conscious of social-distancing protocols, sanitizing and safety. As things change throughout the year, the recess frequency and format may be adjusted.



REMOTE DAY ASSIGNMENTS

As mentioned in out meet the teacher and Open House presentations, we suspended traditional homework assignments for the time-being. Students will be responsible on the remote days for completing assignments, spending time on our digital programs and working in Google Classroom.

Teachers have eased students into this new platform of learning this week by giving very brief and simple assignments. Now as we move forward, students will be responsible for completing work on the remote days. Work on remote days is not **optional** but counts towards attendance and grading. It is important that our parents partner with us to supervise and monitor at home assignments and foster responsibility and accountability in our students.

STUDENT PASSWORDS

Over the past few weeks, we have partnered with Bascom and Mrs. Kowach to update our digital programs so that students have the same passwords for multiple programs. It took a great deal of time, but we have updated I-ready, Think Central, Reflex Math & Lexia so that there is consistency in the student's username and password. This will make it easier when they are not in school to remember their passwords.

Many of the classes are also loading slides into Google Classroom that will keep the student's login information accessible whenever they open Google Classroom.

BENCH MARKING & DIAGNOSTICS

We have started in the initial days of school to begin assessing and benchmarking students in Reading & Math so that we can best align our personnel and resources in the coming days to really target what students' need. When we use multiple pieces of data, it can give us a very clear picture of student strengths and areas of focus for intervention.

We want to target our instruction to work on gaps that likely increased because of our spring closure and the extended time that students were not in school for direct instruction.

We have some very gifted interventionists that will be working on phonemic awareness, phonics, reading fluency & comprehension in small and individualized groups.

STUDENTS MEET THE PRINCIPAL

After the first two days of school, I visited each classroom to meet the students so they could get to know a little bit about me personally and professionally. I also wanted to start to get to know each one of them and begin learning their names.

We talked about important things to focus on this year like health and safety; respectful and responsible behavior and focusing our time and energy on learning.

I stressed to each of the classes that as their principal, I have two very different responsibilities. It is my job to make sure that they understand what is expected of them, hold them accountable for times when they don't always make the best choice and then make sure that the consequences for those choices are clear and consistent. All of us will make mistakes; we learn

from them; we then accept the consequences and graciously move on. Each new day is a new day to start over and do something better than the day before

I also wanted our students to know that besides that very clear focus of discipline and accountability, I deeply care about them. The principal's office can and should also be a place where we go to celebrate good things.,

Our staff is committed to do the very best we can for your children and we are here for them . Yes, we care about how they grow academically, but we also want them to become healthy, whole, happy and successful people.

Thank you for partnering with us and trusting us with your child, your most precious treasure, especially during this unprecedented time in education.


