Restorative Practices Training

In October, Mrs. Amy Frederick and I attended a workshop in Pittsburgh. It was called, "Restorative Practices" and was presented by Kelvin Oliver, who brings to the table an array of educational experience as curriculum director, assistant principal, principal and now an educational consultant.

The best way I can describe this process is it is an added component to discipline. It adds an accountability piece that takes students through a series of steps to reflect on the choice they made. Things like: What choice did you make? How were you feeling before you made that choice? What did you want? How do you feel now? How did this choice hurt you? hurt someone else? What can you do to make it better? What can you do differently? What will happen if you make a better choice next time? It also focuses on how to fix and repair relationships.

I believe it is a powerful piece that digs more deeply into the "why"? It also allows for the opportunity to teach as every poor choice is a teachable moment. We certainly know this as adults. It is a lifelong process for all of us.

They have missed so much of social emotional growth experiences that teach us how to deal with conflict and adversity. It is sometimes a learned response. 

Field Trip to Brecksville Nature Center on Nov. 3rd




Our first field trip of the year will be our 5th graders going to a Nature Preserve in Brecksville.


