In some ways it is hard to believe that we are already to the end of the first quarter; but, on the other hand, the beginning of school seems ages ago. Was it only a few weeks ago that we were measuring our classrooms for social distancing, worrying about out student's adjustment to masks and digital formats and concerned that in the midst of all of these restrictions, they would still feel safe, loved and secure?

In many ways the planning for Covid Response has been much more difficult than the reality. Our students have adjusted well; they are happy, learning and adjusting extremely well to the new definitions of school. Our new protocols have become routine and now are just a normal part of our day.

I keep thinking that the positive side of all this seemingly chaotic time may be that we are teaching our children how to walk through adversity, be resilient, be flexible and work on changing the things we can while accepting the things over which we have no control. Can we do this and still maintain our independence, individuality and our hope? I believe we can and we do.

Please know that in the midst of this fluid Covid situation, we continue to be diligent in following our safety protocols. In some ways I do wish you could visit and see how well the students are doing. We maintain 6 ft. distance in the halls, classrooms, and walking in and out of school. Students have adjusted to wearing masks very well, with very limited reminders. Temperature scans upon entrance to the building are a daily routine. As we progress through the school year and the students adapt further to our new routines and a sense of normalcy settles in, that does not, however, relax our safety protocols. While we have some transitioning in classes, recess and lunch, students remain in small groups with limited contact to others in the building. Though this was a huge change for everyone, it has become ordinary practice. That is a credit to our entire school family, who work together and support all of these new realities.

As I have been observing and visiting classrooms, it has only deepened my respect and appreciation for the staff who interact with your children on a daily basis. I see innovation, enthusiasm, motivated and engaged students, strong relationships that display patience, caring and love. Our students are thriving more each day and blossoming. There is a sweetness in experiencing the resilience of our staff and students to ride out this storm so effectively and so graciously. Thank you for all you do to walk with us and support us daily.

Schedule Change

Notification was sent home via email and video concerning the schedule change for 3rd grade students beginning on November 2nd, which is the beginning of the second quarter.

After tracking and analyzing our enrollment over the last two months of school, considering the protocols for social distancing, the assessment data from our beginning of the year diagnostics, and the educational needs of our students, the decision was made to bring our gray and scarlet cohorts together everyday for daily direct instruction. The combined enrollment numbers of our 3rd grade cohorts are still small and well within the capacity we have in the classroom. The six feet social distancing protocols and all other Covid protocols remain in place for the continued safety of our students and staff.

At the end of the semester, when the enrollment numbers may increase with returning 100% remote students, we may have to return to the current hybrid model. Even one quarter of direct instruction will have a tremendous positive impact on student learning.

REMOTE DAYS- ACCOUNTABILITY

The first quarter certainly was a transition time between our chaotic ending of school last year and finding a new normal. It is clear that students have had a great deal of training and reinforcement as to the expectations and process for completing remote work.

The time required for completing work on remote days is considerably less than what is expected in school (a minimal requirement) and less than what other districts require.

We cannot stress enough how important it is for students to be engaged at home. We have gaps to fill and new standards to teach. We cannot do it without your help. We can control

what happens here but we cannot supervise students at home. This partnership is critical in moving forward. Everything the students are required to dothey should be able to complete independently. Please be careful the balance between helping and supporting your child while they are doing remote work and doing it for them. It is a red flag when the remote work appears to be mastered and student's can then not demonstrate it in school.

The standard for completing work is that it ALL must be done. They cannot just pick and choose what they want to do-all work must be checked off or it is considered incomplete and the requirements not met.

Student Council-Like many things this year, student council will take on a new format. We will have few members elected to the council, limiting the representation and trimming back the number of officers as well. It will be a small group that we believe will work very effectively to plan and execute activities for our student body. Mrs. Wevers has been organizing the campaign that will take place on election day.

Prep Bowl: We are in the planning stages of Prep Bowl and will be sending out invitations to students to take the qualifying test. Following that we will forming teams and practicing will begin after school the week of November 2nd. Some of the practice sessions will be in Google Meet.

Direct Instruction and Distance Learning:

Your students may be coming home and share with you that they are experiencing direct instruction on Google Meet here at school or they may be starting to login in at home to join a class in session here at school. While we are practicing and experimenting with different formats of direct instruction remotely, the premise is that we are preparing our students for whatever format is required in the future. If it became mandated that we needed to all go 100% remote, I want our students to be prepared and ready to receive direct instruction from the teachers. As we have learned from experience, that requires repeated practice to navigate successfully. I've been observing that in progress in several grade levels and the students have been very excited about this experience. I applaud our staff for their innovation and risk-taking so that are students are prepared for any and all digital platforms that may be necessary in the future.
