

### **State Testing at LIS**

State Testing began in the middle of April and will conclude in the first week of May.

While we realize that there will be a Covid -19 pandemic impact of the students scores, there is still important information we can glean from the results.

Coupling those results with our diagnostic testing programs should highlight which students will need to participate in

academic recovery, and the areas where individual students are struggling or have gaps in learning.

This will be a process over the next several years as we address the academic impact of shutdowns, distance learning and our hybrid schedule.

Please know that we are already discussing and planning different formats and programs we can initiate to begin that recovery.

## **Discipline**

When students returned to our building every day for the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter, we anticipated the need for adjustments, and reorienting students to daily instruction. We certainly expected some challenges and clearly knew that they needed to be met with clear expectations and consistent consequences.

One of our greatest challenges is the student-use of technology, which still is an integral part of our school day. Since the beginning of the year, we have made it continually clear to students that technology during the hours when school is in session is limited to ONLY school assigned websites.

I have personally visited classrooms several times to review policies and I have some classrooms that check histories at the end of each day.

There are no more warnings for misuse of technology. It is an automatic detention if students are either not on the website they are instructed to be on, or are visiting sites other than those assigned by the teacher. We do not permit any online chats.

If you wish your child to have the capability of chatting with classmates, you should set up a different google account other than the school account and monitor that chat at home.

### Word of the Day Winners

Everyday on the morning announcements, Mrs. Suzelis announces a word of the day. This is to support our literacy focus and our new understanding of the Science of Reading.

The daily word is announced along with the part of speech, the number of syllables (or parts), the number of sounds, the definition and a sentence using the word in context.

During lunch, students are randomly selected and asked if they know the word of the day and also can answer some questions about it such as the part of speech or the number of syllables.

When they answer correctly, they get to choose a prize from the prize bag that Mrs. Suzelis carries to lunch.


